

How well do you know our principal?

We interviewed our school principal to find out more about him and his plans for the school. It was interesting to find out what he had to say and to find out more about our school principal.

Q: What was it about teaching that attracted you to the career?
A: I always enjoyed working with children. I enjoy the element of fun they bring to every day.

Q: What do you like to do in your spare time?

A: I enjoy being active and outdoors in my spare time. I enjoy sport (mostly hurling and soccer) and farming. I find these activities really help to clear my head after a busy day.

Q: What events are coming up in the school?

A: We have World Book Day on Thursday (March 2nd). We will be doing a dress up day for this. This is a great opportunity for all the children to think creatively and use their imagination to replicate their favourite character from a book they've read.

Seachtain na Gaeilge will take place from March 13th-16th.

FAI boys 5 a side soccer tournament on Friday 2nd of March.

Q: *If you could be anything other than a teacher, what would it be?* **A:** An architect. I enjoy looking at different spaces and trying to maximise their functionality and making them aesthetically pleasing. I would have a lot to learn though!

Q: What did you do before you became a principal?

A: I was a teacher in Dublin and Offaly for a while. I then moved closer to home and began teaching in St. Ita's in Loughrea for just over a year. Then I became principal of our school.

Q: What is your favourite subject to teach? Why?

A: I love teaching maths. I enjoy the structure of it and trying to explain and demonstrate how to solve a problem in different ways.

Q: Why is your job important to the community?

A: My job is important to the community, as a school is a central pillar of every community and being principal of one is an important responsibility. The overwhelming priority for me as principal of Kilnadeema NS is the children. Everything else can wait. 'to-do' lists can be ticked off another day. It is vital that members of the community know that their child, niece or nephew, etc. is really cared for and their voice is heard. When there is a strong trust between me as principal and the community, it leads to flourishing environment for our pupils to learn and prosper.

CLASS PROFILE: SENIOR INFANTS

On February 24th we interviewed Ms. O'Donnell to find out more about our vice principal and what happens in her classroom. Ms. O'Donnell is the Senior Infant teacher. There are 19 children in her class with 8 boys and 11 girls.

Each day, the senior infants begin school at 9:20a.m. and go home at 2:00p.m. One of the most popular times enjoyed by the Senior Infant pupils is Aistear time.

During Aistear, the children will talk and learn about a specific theme for two weeks. They will also engage in group work. For example, one of the most recent Aistear themes Senior Infants were learning about was Spring. One group planted seeds, one group painted flowers and another role-played being at a garden store. The play is controlled and not free play. The children also do regular worksheets relating to the theme of Aistear. All the children enjoy Aistear very much, and most consider it their favourite part of the day.

Ms. O'Donnell told us that her favourite subjects to teach are P.E. and Art. . She told us that "I love the research that goes into art and working with the children when creating it. I love seeing the finished product. I enjoy PE because I want children to enjoy sport."

When asked why she became a teacher she said "I've wanted to be a teacher since I was very little. I loved playing classroom when I was younger. Ms.O'Donnell also told us why she chose Kilnadeema N.S. "I wanted to teach in KNS because it's a nice, small, rural school that reminds me of the school that I used to go to. I also prefer Primary schools that are mixed between girls and boys."




World Book Day takes place every year in Kilnadeema N.S. and we're already looking forward to next year's event.

Middle and Senior classes learned procedures for relieving choking, burns and nosebleeds. They learned what to do in the event of a person fainting, how to recognise the need for CPR and how to perform CPR if needed. Children were also taught to call a nearby adult if an accident had happened and to call one of the two emergency numbers 999 or 112.

"The children in infants learned very basic things, like what to do if they got a cut and how to put on a bandage. The children had lots of fun and really enjoyed it" explained Ms. Comyn, the Junior Infant teacher.



There were several effective adaptations to convert the sports hall into a theatre. These were: large curtains covering all of the walls to eliminate the echo and darken the hall. There was also an impressively large HD screen as a backdrop for the stage that changed with every scene. Other adaptions were stage lighting, a speaker system and a raised stage.

All of our class thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

School Facts

Kilnadeema N.S. is a co. educational school located in a rural setting overlooking the town of Loughrea. The history of the school dates back to over a hundred and twenty years ago.

1902- The doors of Kilnadeema girls and boys school officially opened under the one roof (as the wall plaques show). The estimated cost of the two roomed school was €668.

1940's- Some refurbishment was carried out on the building.

1972- A two room prefabricated extension was added to the school to prepare for the arrival of pupils from Aille N.S. which closed in 1973.

Late 1970's- The wide stone wass which divided the girls and boys schools was removed and replaced with a folding wooden partition. This enabled the school to be converted into a hall.

1994- Work began on the refurbishment of the old building as well as a two classroom extension, staffroom, toilets and resource room.

Late 1990's- Two more prefabs were added to the school due to growing enrolment figures.

2007- A third prefab was added to the school.

2011- An extension was built that included a medical room and an office.

2023- A new prefab is due to arrive this year due to a resurgence in enrolment figures.

How are we helping?



Making Waves

This term third to sixth class have been busy with swimming lessons at Coral Leisure Centre Ballinasloe every Thursday.

The swimming course is stretched out over a period of seven weeks with six lessons in total. The lessons aim to promote healthy habits and is an important life skill for the children. There are three levels: Foundation, Intermediate and Advanced. The foundation level helps on improving confidence in the water and early swimming skills. The intermediate level focuses on building your confidence in the water that was acquired in the foundation level and improving your stroke. The advanced level continues to work on improving your stroke, introduces life saving skills and improves confidence in deep water.

Each lesson is thirty to thirty-five minutes, after which, the children are allowed five to ten minutes of free play. During this time, everyone is allowed to leave their groups to have fun and play games together.
